



2020 COMMUNITY CONSULTATIONS

This report is a summary of how the Board received and collected community input in 2020. Comments and questions from community members inform the Boards' understanding of what the community needs, values and expects from police services in Winnipeg. The Board considers this input when it sets strategic priorities for the Winnipeg Police Service.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic of 2020, many of the strategies of the communication plan for 2020 were cancelled or postponed as a result of the self-isolation and physical distancing measures put in place by the City, the Province and the Federal Government. Even as the Province began the reopening phases, it was unknown when groups of more than 50 people could gather inside for community events which put this effort on hold. The board posted a new on-line survey on its website to encourage citizens to provide feedback and again this year, the majority of responses were received after major incidents occurred.
