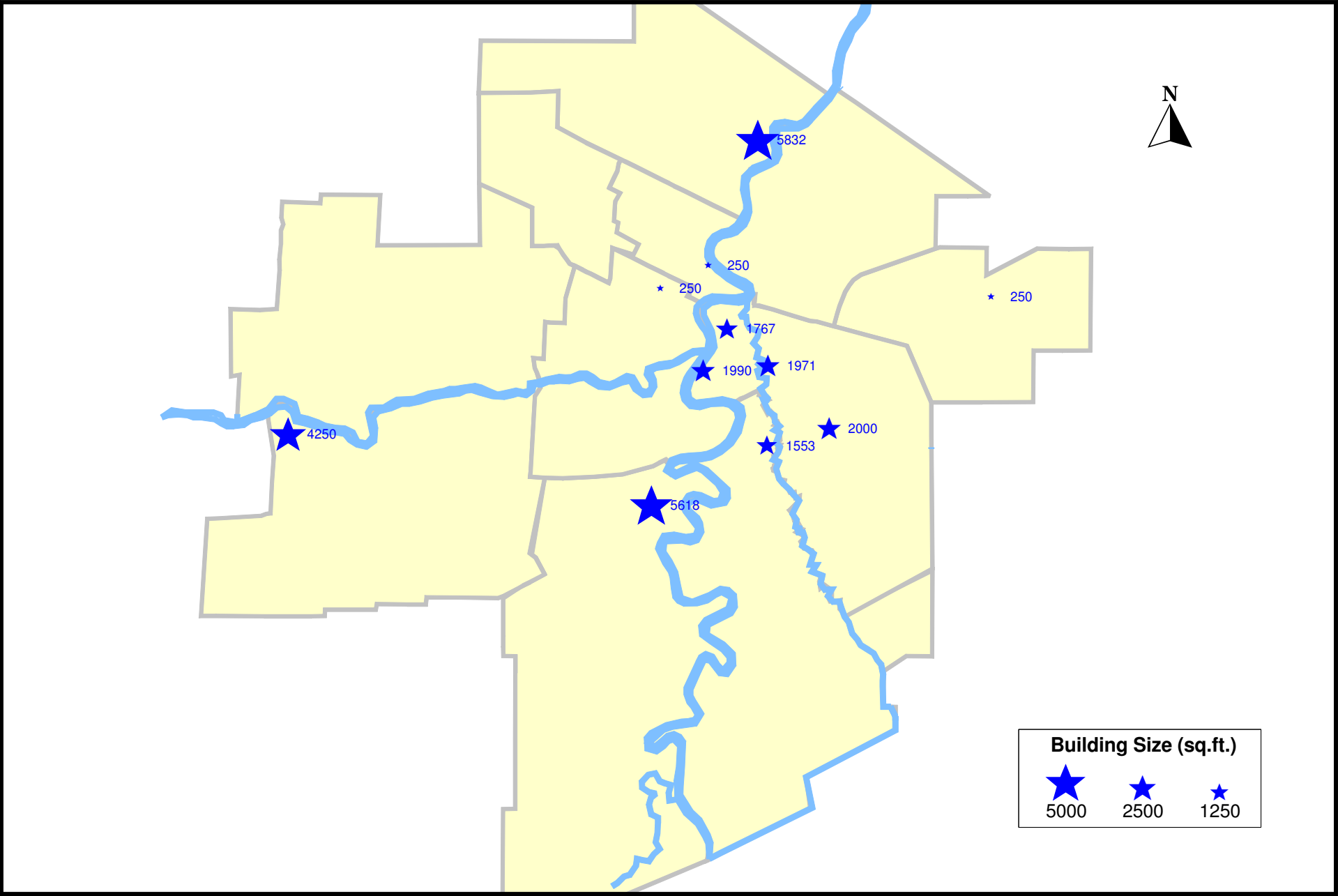

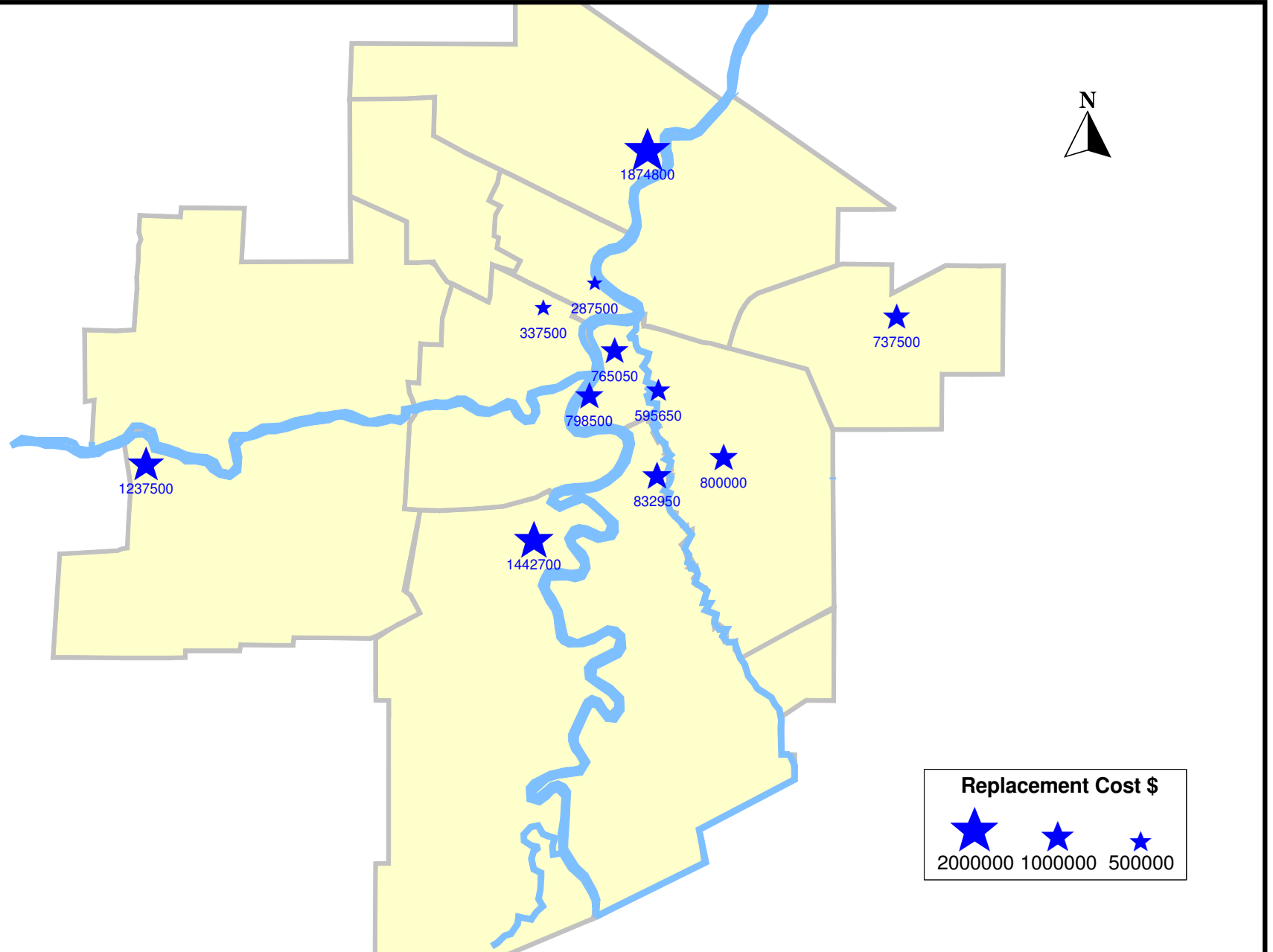
Outdoor Pools - Year Built



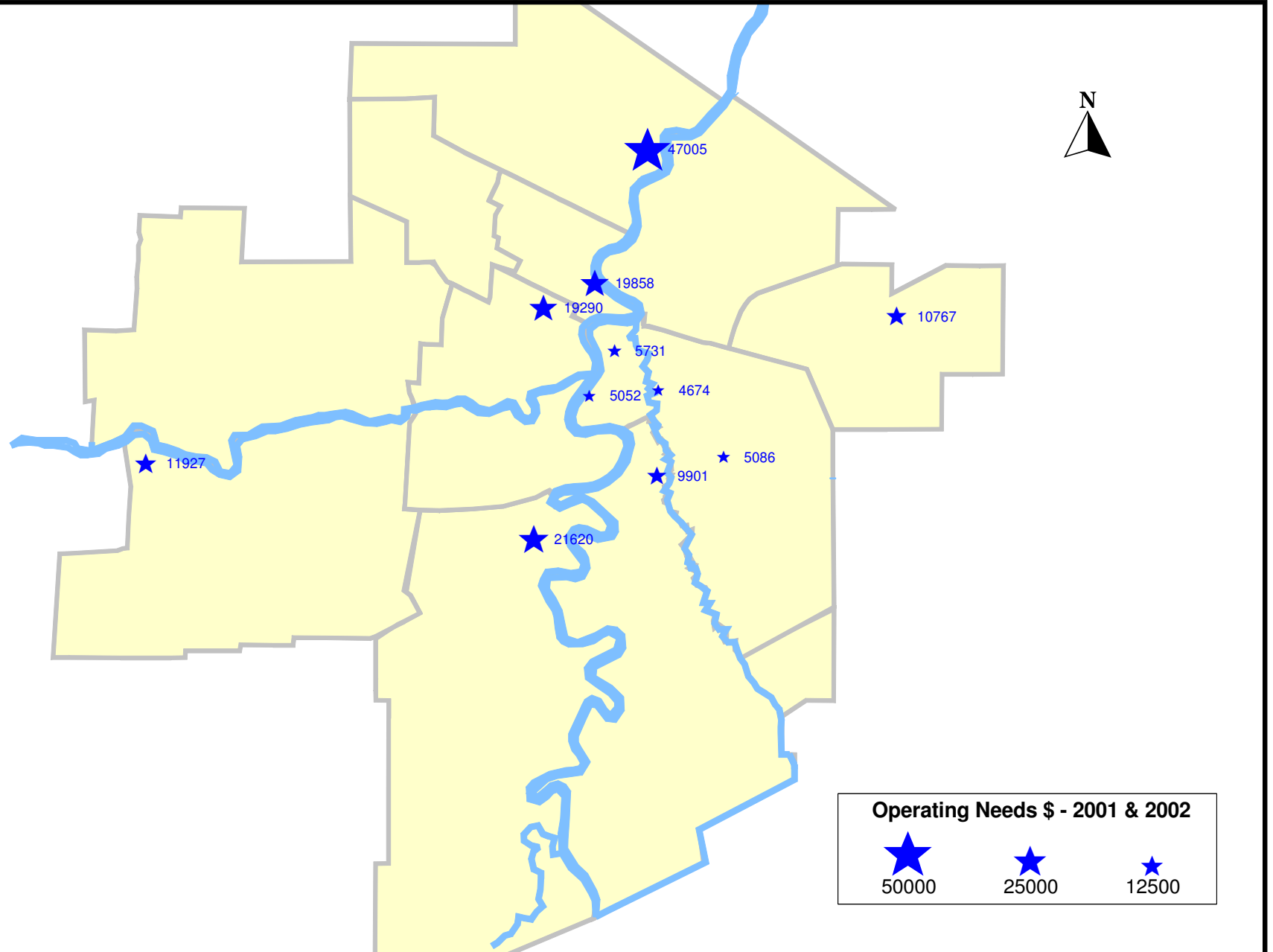
Outdoor Pools - Building Size



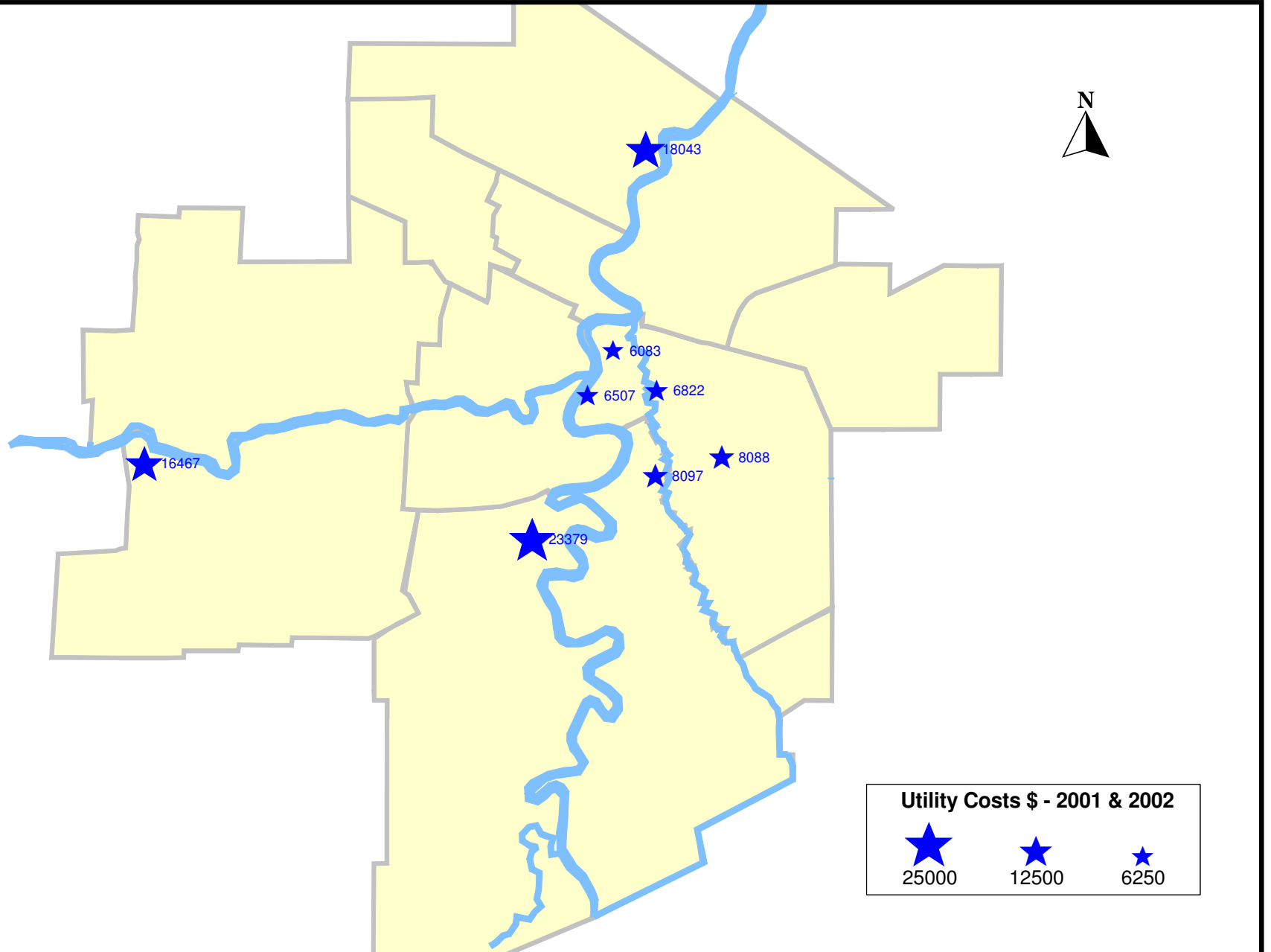
Outdoor Pools - Replacement Cost



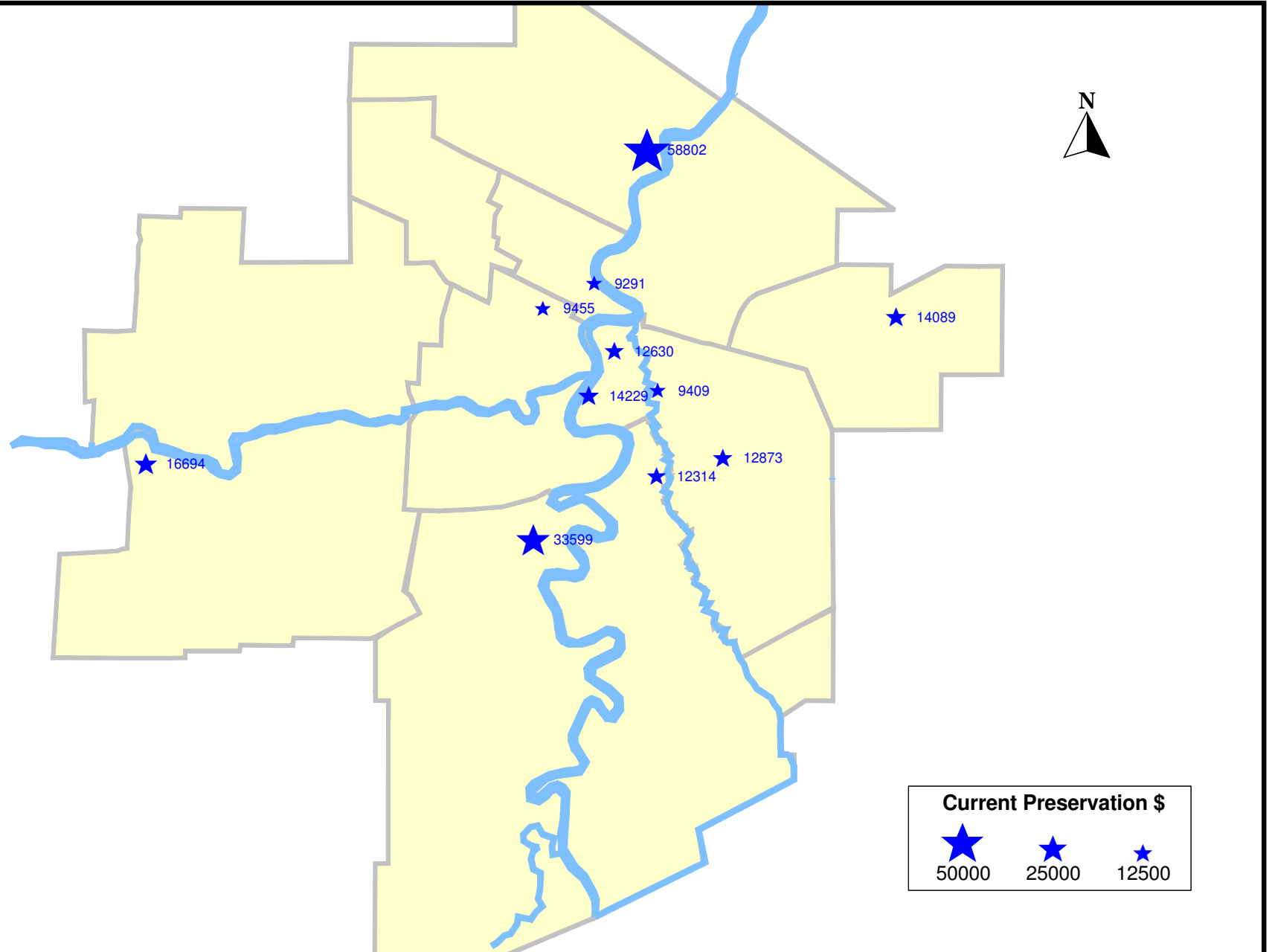
Outdoor Pools - Operating Needs



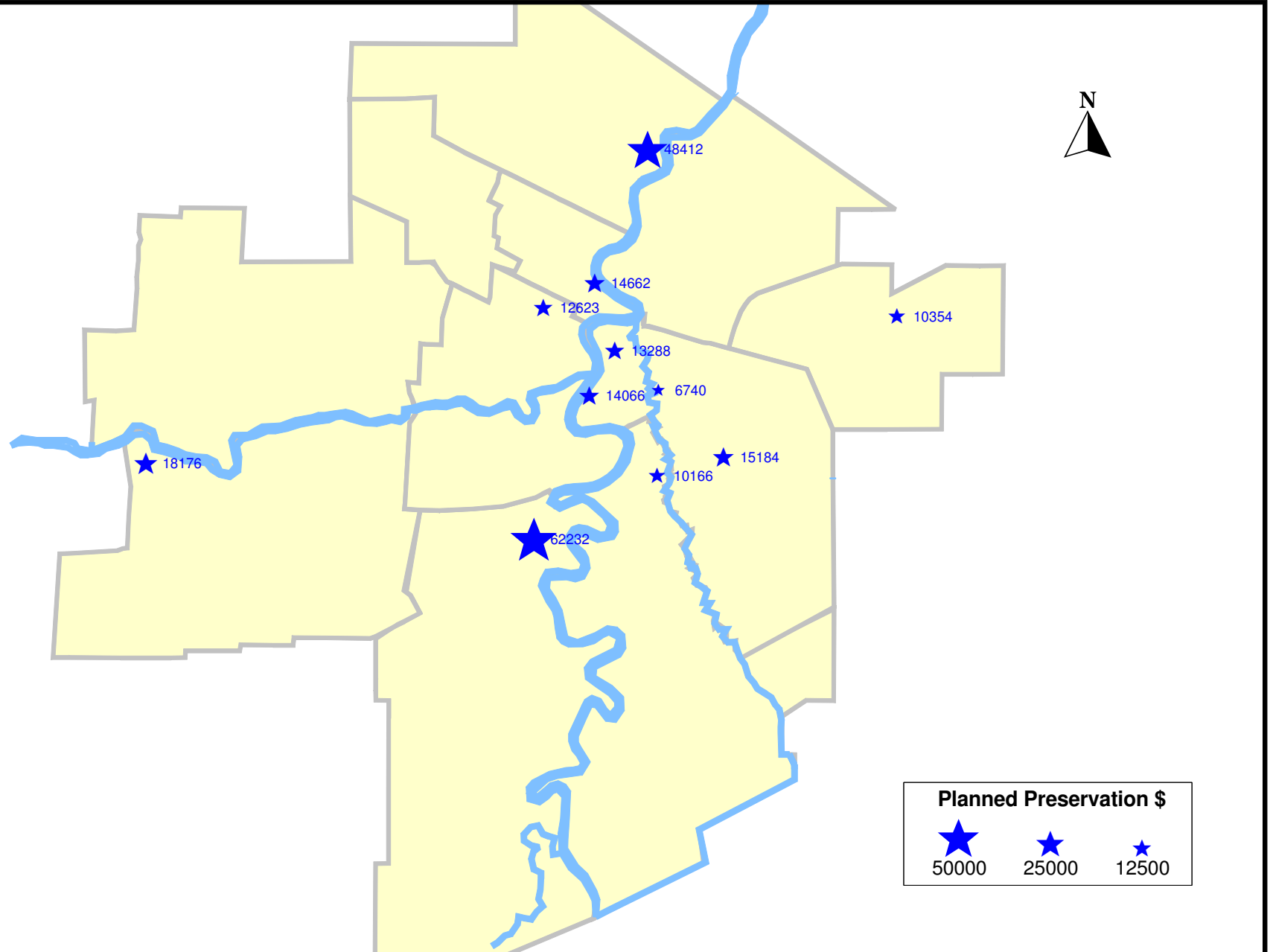
Outdoor Pools - Utility Costs



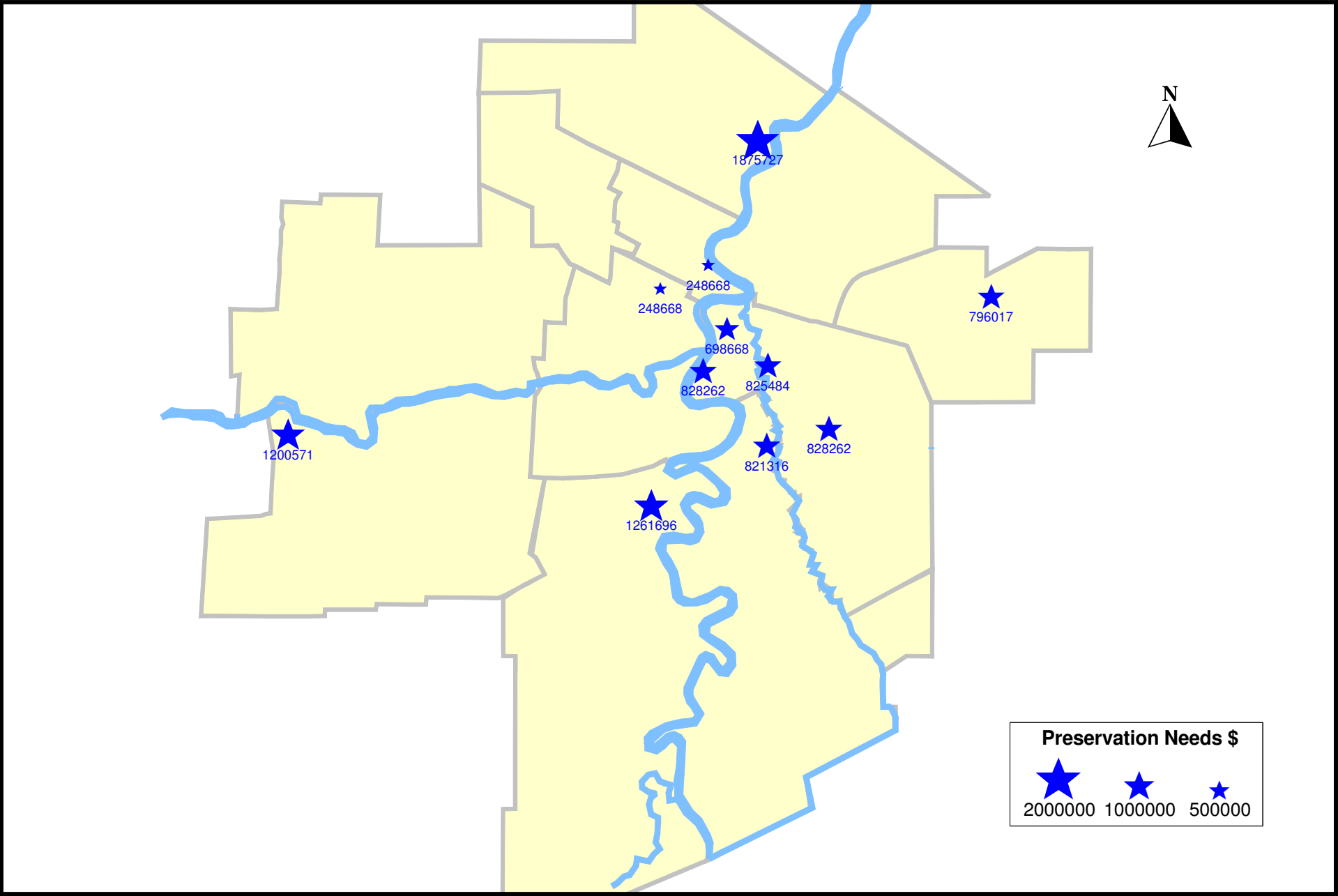

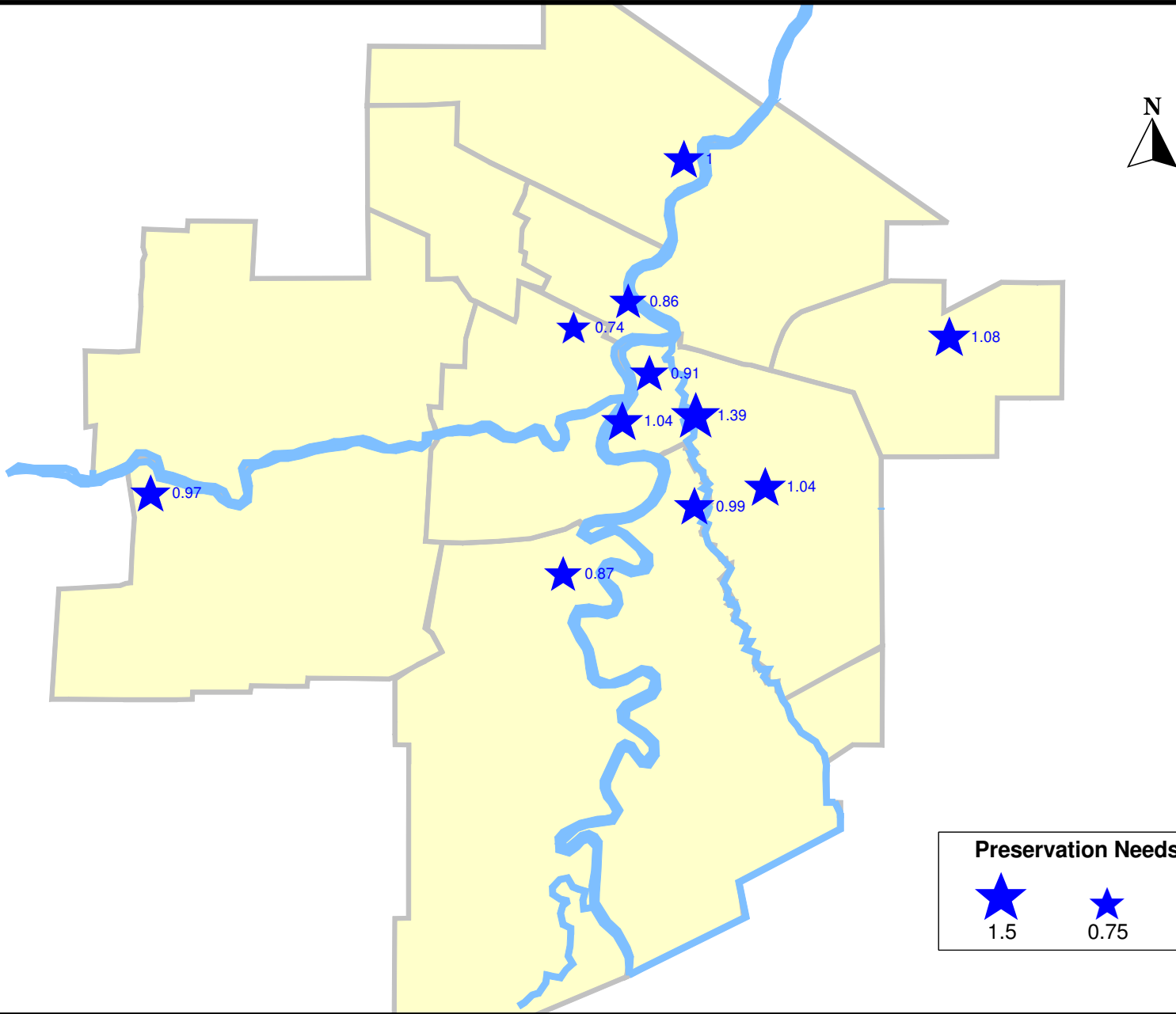
Outdoor Pools - Planned Preservation



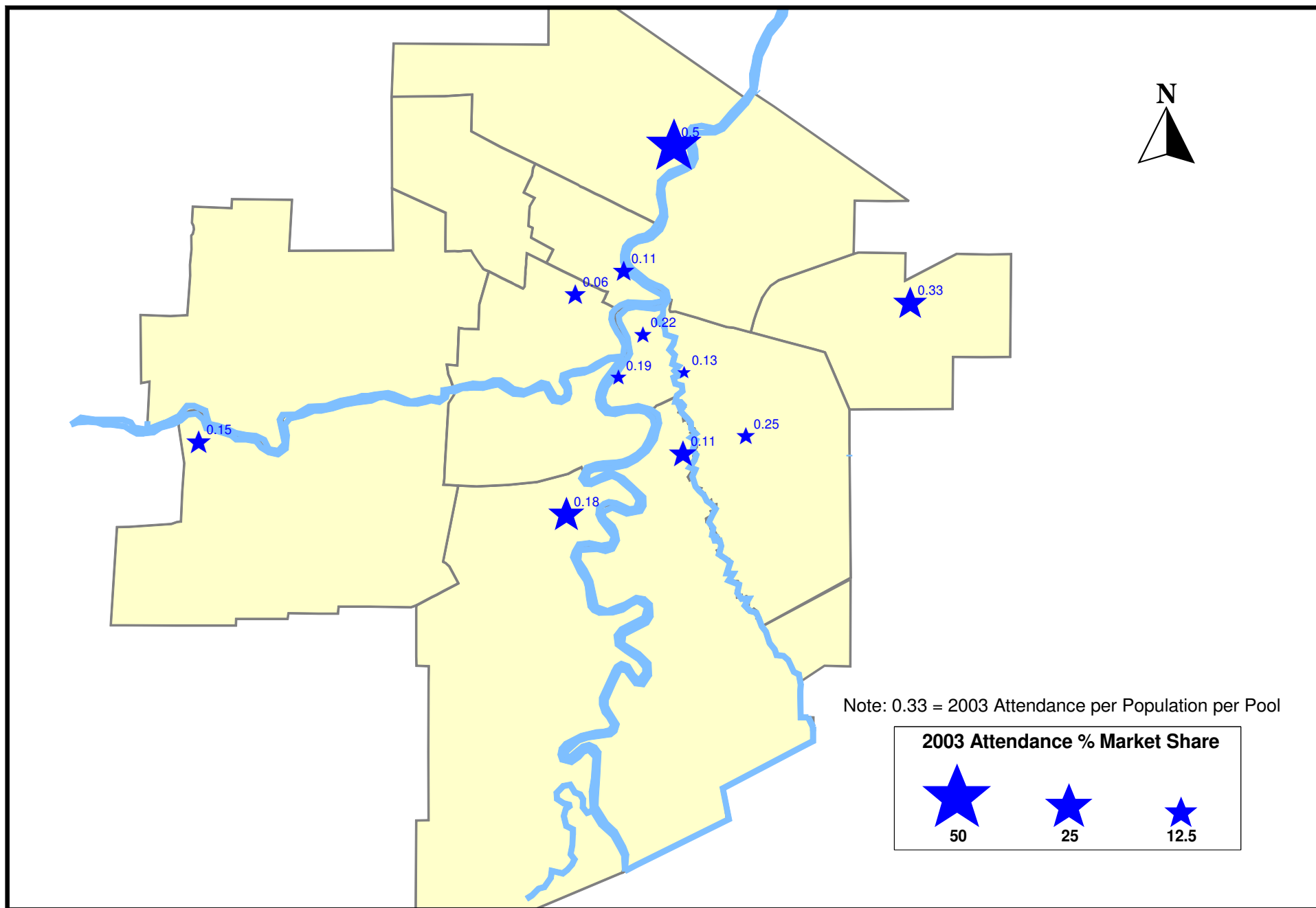
Outdoor Pools - Preservation Needs
